Although we were initially faced with gloomy skies last Wednesday on the day of our Faction Carnival, the clouds and showers eventually cleared and the students thoroughly enjoyed coming together in their factions and competing in races and team games. For the first time we had timing gates at the finishing line which were kindly funded by the P&C. These proved quite helpful on more than one occasion when there were some very close finishes in the minor placings. The pre-primary and year 1 students participated in a games tabloid following their races and showed their expertise in tunnel ball and the egg and spoon races among other events. The remainder of the students competed in team events which varied according to their year group and finished off with relays. At the completion of the carnival, Kimberley were the winning faction with 930 points, Cambridge were second with 796 points followed by Northwood with 742 point and Woolwich with 737 points. West Leederville Primary school has a team of staff dedicated to supporting our students with identified special learning needs and/or any social and emotional concerns they may have at school or at home. Our **Learning Support Team**, led by Associate Principal Lisa Wade, consists of: a school psychologist, Lauren Gabelich (on site two days per week); a school chaplain Corali SalaTenna (on site two days per week); an English as a second dialect (EAL/D) Education Assistant, Candice Nicholas (on site 3 days per week; and nine Special Needs Education Assistants, Lisa Robbins, Fonz Beaugearde, Michelle Dwyer, Julian Cosentino, Jane Jenkin, Donna Dwyer, Amanda Wira, Milaika Jordan & Shikha Sharotri.

This committed team of staff work tirelessly to ensure that all of our students have a positive school experience. Their work includes running case conferences with parents, teachers and outside agencies; developing individual plans for students identified needs, including medical issues such as anaphylaxis;

Food Allergy/Anaphylaxis

Australia has one of the highest incidence of food allergy in the world and this is increasing at an alarming rate; in fact, one in 10 babies born in Australia will develop a food allergy. With no known cure for food allergy, awareness and education is of utmost importance, as a severe allergic reaction and/or anaphylaxis can rapidly become life threatening, and must be treated as a medical emergency.

The most common triggers, causing 90 percent of allergic reactions in Australians are egg, cow's milk, peanut, tree nuts (such as cashew and almond), sesame, soy, wheat, fish and shellfish.

At West Leederville Primary School we have several students who have been diagnosed with serious allergies which may result in anaphylaxis and in particular, nuts are a common trigger to these students. It is important to understand that in some people even very small amounts of food

can cause a life-threatening allergic reaction/anaphylaxis. For this reason we would like to take this opportunity to remind parents to be vigilant in vetting food added to their child's lunch box to ensure that none contain nuts.

Currently, there is no cure for food allergy. Avoidance of the food is the only way to prevent a reaction.

From from the School Psychologist-Child Anxiety

BRAVE is an online, psychological program for the treatment of childhood and adolescent anxiety. The Program was developed by a team of researchers at the University of Queensland. As a result, the Program is based on actual research evidence, and parents can rest assured their child is receiving a high quality treatment program.

Anxiety is an important problem that many children and teenagers suffer from. We often think our child is "going through a phase" and that there is nothing to worry about. Children themselves tend to avoid their negative feelings. However, it is imperative to be able to read the signs because:

•Around 8-10% of children and adolescents are affected by anxiety.

•Anxiety can be extremely debilitating and cause significant problems in a person's emotional, social and educational functioning.

•Children and adolescents with anxiety may worry about all sorts of things: meeting new people, being away from home, performing in front of people or even things going on in the world.

•Other children and teenagers worry about very specific situations (such as getting injections or flying on planes) and others just seem to be worrying about something all the time.

With BRAVE, children, teenagers and their parents have access to an online cognitive-behaviour therapy in the comfort of their own home.

You can also have a BRAVE Trainer help you through the program, someone who works with you to overcome your anxiety. They will email you each week, and even talk to you over the phone during the program.
