Inner City College

As you may be aware, the State Government recently announced a new local intake secondary school, Inner City College (planning name), in Subiaco.

The local intake area for Inner City College is now available for you to view on the Department of Education's website at education.wa.edu.au and includes all homes in the current West Leederville Primary School intake area.

If your children are in Year 4 and below you will have the opportunity to enrol them in this new secondary school in the heart of Subiaco. Opening for 250 Year 7 students in 2020, the school will grow to accommodate a total of 2000 Year 7 to 12 students by 2025.

Children will have access to a brand new school close to home with world class facilities and equipment to deliver an exciting and innovative education for 21st century learners. The school will also offer a Gifted and Talented academic program, with the first intake of 32 students in Year 7 in 2020.

The announcement of the local intake area for Inner City College means local intake areas for Churchlands Senior High School, Shenton College and Mount Lawley Senior High School have been amended. Families with children currently living in the existing local intake areas for Churchlands Senior High School, Shenton College and Mount Lawley Senior High School will have the choice for their children to attend either their current local intake school or the new Inner City College, if they are in the local intake area for the new school.


Making Kites in Pre-primary

Parent Traps

It's tough being a parent but it's easy to fall into one of the common parenting traps.

The criticism trap is when there are frequent power struggles with your child. The situations escalate from criticising to threatening and yelling. This type of discipline often backfires. The parent's anger makes the child and parent resentful and hostile. If these kinds of battles take place frequently, its time to try a new way of handling the situation.

The "leave them alone" trap involves the parent simply not acknowledging their child when they are behaving well. If good behaviour is taken for granted it may be replaced with the misbehaviour that receives more attention. A basic principle of positive parenting is to praise behaviours you would like to see more often.

The "for the sake of the children" trap occurs when parents in unhappy marriages stick doggedly to the same marriage routines, for the sake of the children, rather than addressing the problems constructively.

The perfect parent trap. There is no such thing as a perfect parent and trying to be one will only lead to disappointment, resentment, guilt, and feelings of inadequacy.

The martyr trap is one where parents become so over-involved in the task of parenting they neglect their own needs. The parents' relationship suffers and may end in feelings of dissatisfaction and resentment. Quality parenting can only happen when adults have their own lives in balance.

Moreton Bay Fig Tree report

Recently an arborist report was commissioned for our iconic Moreton Bay Fig tree. The tree was assessed in accordance with the 'visual tree assessment'. The VTA method is based on the sciences of tree biology, physiology, tree structure, and tree bio-mechanics. It is a method widely used by arborists worldwide to identify visible signs on trees that indicate any health or potential structural issues that in turn could increase the risks associated with the given tree.

Elements of the report indicate that the tree continues to remain in excellent health and vigour based on the condition of its leaf and overall volume of canopy mass. Inspection of the canopy suggests that a smaller branch in the upper canopy has failed, and then may have fallen onto the lower branch causing it to fail as a result of the sudden loading.

Weight loading in the Tree's canopy does not look to be excessive at this time, and any further canopy thinning or reduction is considered likely to either detract from the aesthetics and amenity that the tree provides to the area in which it is situated and/or have the potential to impact its future health and potential life span.

As such, other than the removal of the broken branch lodged in the canopy of the tree, and the removal of the remains of the broken branches, no further management is considered necessary at this time.

Consequently, the results are very positive for this significant tree and for this school amenity.

Sandpit facelift

The sandpit area of the pre-primary playground has undergone a facelift recently, thank you to some imaginative suggestions by the teaching staff, some P&C funding and some hard working volunteer families.

An overwhelmingly popular addition to the area was the installation of a boat complete with steering wheel and telescope. Our appreciation is extended to the Finch and Williams families for their generous contribution in preparing and installing the boat into the area.



In addition, a mud-pie kitchen has also been added along with some wooden cable drums which seem to have no end of use for a child's imagination.

These additions have made the sandpit a dynamic play area during recess and lunch times.
