On Tuesday the 31st October WLPS invited Ruth O'Boyle and Stitches the Bear to join us for a special assembly. The assembly was to introduce the Big Splash WA mental health campaign that is raising awareness of child and adolescent mental health.

The ripple effects of a mental health crisis are enormous and we all know the impact on families, school friends and the community can be devastating. However, early intervention is the key and through this campaign we hope to empower our WLPS students with the knowledge that they are not alone, that it's ok to talk about their feelings and concerns and real help is available.

We introduced the dolphin sculpture to the students and encouraged them to participate in planning a design and name for the dolphin that will make it part of the WLPS Community. Early next year our dolphin will join many other adopted dolphins in a Farewell Event in the city.

Our participation in The Big Splash WA also gives us access to age appropriate resource kits developed by leading experts in the mental health field and are to be used in conjunction with the Bounce Back Program within the school.

We hope that this initiative will promote positive conversations about mental health and wellbeing in our school and wider community.

Excelling at Mathematics

Earlier this year, a number of WLPS students from years 3 to 6 participated in this year's Australian Mathematics Competition. The Australian Mathematics Competition is a mathematics competition run by the Australian Mathematics Trust for students from Years 3-12 in Australia and their equivalent grades in other countries. Since its inception in 1976, the participation numbers have increased to around 600,000, with around 100,000 being from outside Australia, making it the world's largest mathematics competition.

At last week's assembly, those who achieve at distinction level and higher were acknowledged. Three of our students, Tetsushi Year 3, Taro Year 6 and Saya Year 4, scored high distinctions, with Saya awarded a prize and 'best in school'. Taro's and Tetsushi's scores placed them in the top 3% of students tested in their respective groups in Australia and Saya scored in the top 1%. Congratulations to all our competitors.

Year 6 Debating

Today, teams from Kapinara, City Beach, Mt Hawthorn, Floreat Park and West Leederville Primary Schools participated in the annual Town of Cambridge inter-school debating competition. Our debate topic was that 'we should ban children under the age of 18 from participating in talent and reality television shows'.

All the schools were really competitive, very persuasive and displayed great sportsmanship. Though we did not win, we had a great time and competed to the best of our abilities. We would like to thank both Mr McInerheney for accompanying us and giving us this wonderful opportunity.

2017 Christmas Concert

The WLPS Christmas concert is fast approaching! Please put the date in your diary - Week 10, WEDNESDAY 13 DECEMBER, 6pm in the amphitheatre. ALL students from Kindy to Year 6 will be performing a popular Christmas carol for your enjoyment. Be prepared for your children to be singing the house down, as I will be asking them all to start practising in Week 4!

IMSS Aptitude testing

Instrumental testing is underway for all Year 2 and 3 students!

Miss Samsa is currently busy conducting the MAI - Musical Aptitude Test for all current Years 2 and 3 students. For 2018 the following placements are offered:

8 violin places for Year 3 students

3 cello places for Year 4 students

It is essential to discuss with your child the commitment and dedication involved in learning a musical instrument, such as the violin and cello. Once a child is selected and a placement is accepted, it is an expectation that the child will STAY in the program until the end of Year 6 at WLPS. If any child exits the program for any reason, they are never replaced.

Some information regarding the process that you may find beneficial:

The SIM (School of Instrumental Music) program is now called IMSS (Instrumental Music School Services).

IMSS offers a number of places each year for students who demonstrate musical aptitude to learn violin, viola or cello at school (in 2018 only violin and cello are offered), so that they can further develop their musical skills. This term students in Years 2 and 3 will undergo a musical aptitude test in their music class in which innate musical ability is measured (i.e. it is not a theory test students can study for). Students who score highly on this test, and who show appropriate commitment to their study habits in the classroom, will be short-listed for further testing as to their suitability for the instrument. The program is for beginners as lessons are delivered in groups that cannot cater for varying grade levels (i.e. not for those who are already learning the instrument in question outside school).

Once aptitude testing is completed, formal offers will then be sent to the parents/guardians of selected students. Further information about the program can be found on the Instrumental Music School Services website <http://det.wa.edu.au/imss/detcms/portal/>
